Our History

The 'Seventh Day Adventist Welfare Service' (SAWS) is established by the Seventh Day Adventist Church to provide immediate emergency relief and welfare.

1956

SAWS organizes a relief shipment of supplies to 29 countries valued at USD\$2.3 million over 4 years targeted at South America and the Middle East.

1958-62

SAWS broadens its mission focus from disaster relief to long term programs. SAWS is changed to 'Seventh Day Adventist World Service'.

1970-73

SAWS becomes the 'Adventist Development and Relief Agency' (ADRA) working in community development, food distributions and emergency relief.

1983

The local SDA Church plays an active part within the Myanmar Health Department and establishes what we know today as ADRA Myanmar.

1984

ADRA Myanmar is registered with the Ministry of Home Affairs and builds a working relationship with the Ministry of Education (MoE-DTVE).

1992

ADRA is one of the world's leading NGOs. ADRA International is established in the US and granted General Consultative Status by ECOSOC.

1997

ADRA Myanmar signs an MoU with the Ministry of Health of Sports and the Ministry of Social Welfare Relief and Resettlement

2000's

Cyclone Nargis wreaks havoc across Myanmar causing USD\$10 billion in damage. ADRA Myanmar uses international emergency funds to provide relief.

2008

ADRA Myanmar establishes 4 core sectors: Sustainable Livelihoods, Education, Health & Nutrition and Emergency Response.

2016

Monsoonal floods cause widespread damage in Kayin State. ADRA Myanmar provides emergency food packages to affected communities.

2018

ADRA Myanmar celebrates their 35th Anniversary and gains the USD\$23 million European Union funded CASE2Learn project, the largest project to date.

2019

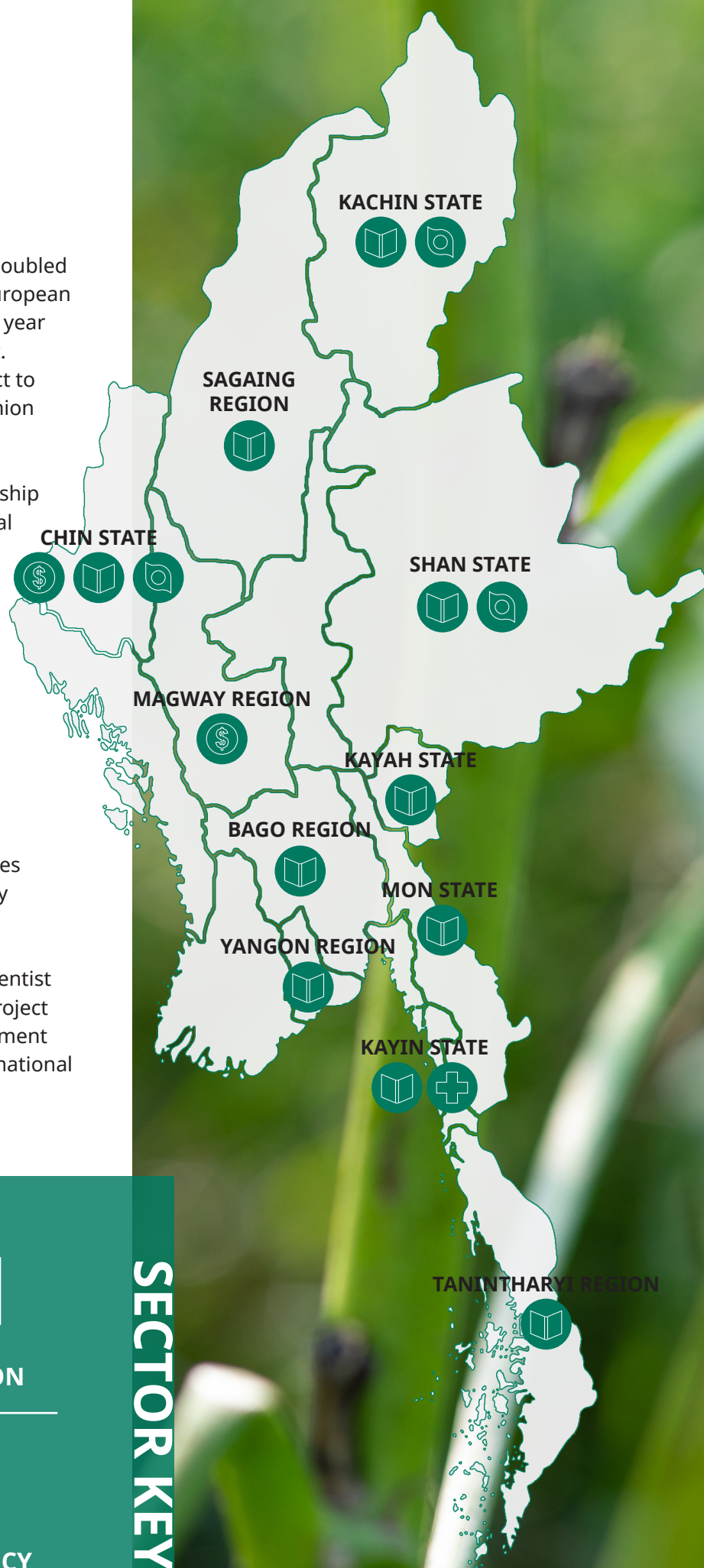


Where We Work

In 2019, ADRA Myanmar’s programs doubled in funding with the provision of the European Union funded CASE2Learn project, a 5 year extension of the former CASE+ project. CASE2Learn is the largest ADRA project to receive funding from the European Union around the world to date.

ADRA Myanmar also resumed partnership with LIFT, a consortium of international donors after 5 years through the VESI project in partnership with AVSI and the Finnish Refugee Council. ADRA Myanmar continues to provide support across all four sectors; Livelihoods, Education, Health and Emergency, which were refined through the re-brand by ADRA International earlier in the year.

ADRA Myanmar was also chosen to participate as one of ten focus countries in ADRA International’s global advocacy campaign targeted at Out of School Children through a 3 year project in partnership with the Seventh Day Adventist Church. ADRA Myanmar’s advocacy project is targeted at supporting Non-Government teachers for a change in policy at the national level in regards to financing.

Livelihoods Sector

The **LIVELIHOODS** sector aims to increase food security, livelihoods and resilience in the Central Dry Zone and upland areas of Myanmar. This is achieved by diversifying livelihoods, introducing climate-smart agricultural approaches such as; drip irrigation, as well as piloting holistic grazing management practices to address land degradation and desertification for those living within the Central Dry Zone.

Programs are focused on building technical knowledge and learning to enable future evidence-based planning and policy dialogue with the Government of Myanmar to address; climate change and extreme weather related events, building resilience through enabling the development of absorptive, adaptive and transformative capacities, and knowledge and strategies for sustainable livelihoods.

Programs in Upland areas focus on improving natural resource management and land use planning using Sloping Agricultural Land Technologies (SALT) and diversifying livelihoods to reduce dependence on rain fed agriculture to improve water resource management. This promotes sustainable forest land management and prevention of land degradation through reducing overuse of Swidden agriculture techniques.

U HO LING

“Chin State is very poor so agricultural support is very important and benefits our region. Thank you to the Donors and ADRA.”

My name is U Ho Ling and I am 52 years old from Siatalai village in the Chin Hills. I have 11 family members including 6 sons, but not all live here.

In the past, our main livelihood was shifting cultivation, primarily growing maize. During that time it was very difficult and there wasn’t always enough food for our village, sometimes there were shortages.

Because of this, we decided to change to Elephant Foot Yam farming which is very popular in our area, especially selling to the Chinese. We believed it would benefit our family. It was very difficult to start and required a lot of hard work. We would find the seeds in the forest to plant but it would take several years for them to grow big enough to sell. Each year it cost 20 lahks to grow Elephant Foot Yam, and I now have 15 acres. It was difficult on me and my family.

In 2017 we heard about the SURE project that provided training in new agriculture techniques and distributed different vegetable seeds. This inspired us to be more interested in agriculture.

ADRA introduced us to an Elephant Foot Yam cutting machine and washer which cuts labour time and is cheaper to manage. ADRA also provided us with a solar dryer powered by solar energy. In the past we depended on clear sunny skies, but in monsoon season we couldn’t dry the harvest well. The solar dryer has really improved our situation as farmers for time and cost.

Today, all the villagers have become Elephant Foot Yam farmers like me.

Education Sector

The **EDUCATION** sector aims to provide assistance to teachers, students, communities and schools to enhance local education systems and improve quality of learning through the provision of learning materials, developing school infrastructure, promoting professional development of teachers, support to school management committees and parent teacher associations, support for advocacy and policy development, developing WASH infrastructure, carrying out school based hygiene promotion sessions and training in income generation activities.

The programs promote inclusion and social cohesion to address needs of learners, lessen gender imbalances, increase protection of women, girls and boys and positively shape values, attitudes and skills. ADRA collaborates with the government and has developed positive relationships with Indigenous Providers of Education in conflict affected areas where children do not have access to an education reaching thousands of Out of School children through the teachers, establishing Education service (TEES) programs and distributing teaching and learning materials to reach over 200,000 students. Programs support 2,000+ schools and 4,000+ teachers. For those who have 'missed' the opportunity for education, technical and vocational education and training (TVET) programs provide youth with employable skills through market-driven competency-based short courses, certified by the Myanmar Government.

ADRA's advocacy and policy engagement is evidence based and developed around synergies that build cooperation and mutual trust between key stakeholders supporting the humanitarian-development-peace nexus. In addition, ADRA is also a part of the Education Development Partners Coordination Group (EDPCG) and technical working groups.

KAWT PHAUNG

"We have benefitted greatly. Before, we couldn't do activities in the old school building. In this new building, we can do anything. We can create more."

Kawt Phaung village is located in Kawkareik Township, Kayin State. Currently, 69 students (KG-Grade 4) attend Kawt Phaung Primary School. Previously, the environment was not conducive to learning. The school building was small and accommodation tight. They had no library or teacher's office and during monsoon season, the roof would leak. It was difficult for the students to study.

Through the AEON project, ADRA supported the construction of a new school building and provided teaching materials. Now, children can learn freely in a wide and open space with quiet rooms all year round. They can create and enhance their learning in a new environment. The students were also taught how to wash their hands and given soap, toothpaste and toothbrushes to use. Principal Daw Nan Thandar Soe said, *"It is good for the children, they wash their hands before lunch time and after having lunch, they can clean their teeth. It is good manners for them."*

"ADRA also provided TOT training for our teachers. It is effective for our teaching methods. I expect a lot, I want them to be educated. I want to see them back here working if we retire. Parents are also afforded more awareness on the importance of education and are being encouraged to participate in their child's schoolwork. They are willing to be involved in school activities. They formed a school committee and underake healthy cooking for their children," commented Principal Daw Nan Thandar Soe.

One of the Grandmother's named Daw Win Than commented; *"My two grandchildren are currently attending this school. In the beginning, they had little space. Now the teaching rooms are great. ADRA provided new school accommodation, furniture and school equipment. Children can learn happily and freely. I would like to say thank you to all."*

The **HEALTH** sector supports vulnerable population groups in conflict affected areas. ADRA Myanmar actively supports health in Myanmar through a (MoU) Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Health since 1993 and has built strong working relationships with local authorities at Township, State and National levels as well as Ethnic Health Organisations.

The programs improve the health and nutrition of communities by; training health workers in maternal, new born and child health (MNCH), improving nutrition rates amongst pregnant mothers and children, providing hygiene education, developing water, sanitation and medical facilities, operating mobile health clinics, providing medical supplies, supporting referrals, promoting healthy living and increasing awareness on relevant health issues.

ADRA Myanmar’s MNCH program focuses on high impact activities to reduce childbirth related deaths for women and newborns. The programs train auxiliary midwives and health staff in safe birthing practices, develop community support mechanisms, improve community health seeking behaviours, develop equity in health systems and ethnic areas, and improve rural health centres in order to increase access.

Nutrition programs focus on the 1,000-day window offering gender sensitive awareness sessions, integrating nutrition education with ECD programs as well as increasing staff capacity utilising the PD Hearth approach to addressing malnutrition through; kitchen gardening, food preparation, food preservation and provision of micro-nutrients.

ADRA Myanmar supports Community Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) programs and establishes tube wells, gravity flow systems and rain collection systems to ensure safe water supplies.

ZAR ZAR NAING

“As a result, through ADRA’s project and the knowledge we have gained, we can take better care of our children. I would like to say thank you to ADRA and the donor, Global Affairs Canada.”

My name is Daw Zar Zar Naing, I am 35 years old living in Ka Di Kan Village with my husband and our three daughters. In 2012 we moved to this area in Hlaingbwe Township, Kayin State. I was recently pregnant and hoping to give birth to a healthy baby.

Our primary livelihood is chicken and goat farming on a plantation. Sometimes my husband finds work outside for additional income. Before the EMBRACE project came to our village, I didn’t know how to cook healthy meals or grow vegetables in our garden. I delivered all our children in our home and we never went to the clinic for check-ups because we didn’t know any of the risks associated with pregnancy.

I received a lot of knowledge in the health and nutrition trainings which I tried to implement in my home. We learned step by step, so it was easy to follow. Now I know the risks that can come with pregnancy, I will deliver this baby in the clinic. My husband is also encouraging me to go to the clinic for check-ups and delivery. We want to give this baby the best chance we can and we as a family are now more prepared.

Ko Nyein Chan Aung, Daw Zar Zar Naing’s husband comments; *“Thank you so much to ADRA and the donor because when the project came to our village, I can learn something I didn’t know about agriculture, livestock and healthy living.”*

**Since reporting this story, Daw Zar Zar Naing has given birth to a healthy baby girl in the local health clinic with the support of her husband Ko Nyein Chan Aung.*

Emergency Sector

The **EMERGENCY** sector provides humanitarian assistance to those affected by natural disasters or conflict through multi-purpose cash grants, cash for work, food assistance, non-food items, shelter assistance, and increasing access to clean water and sanitation facilities.

ADRA Myanmar has a National Emergency Management Plan (NEMP) in place that enables the rapid mobilization of team members and resources in the event of a disaster. Several of ADRA Myanmar’s staff have been trained in Emergency Response in order to provide and lead the technical support required during an emergency in country.

ADRA Myanmar has strong capacities in emergency assessment, coordinating with the government and UN cluster systems on joint assessment and humanitarian programming working with UN-OCHA, UNHCR, WFP, UNICEF, the Ministry of Social Welfare and the Department for Disaster Management (DDM).

Through local partnerships such as AVSI and the Finnish Refugee Council, ADRA Myanmar works in conflict affected areas in Kachin and Northern Shan States to support the education of children and youth, health and livelihoods for IDPs in more than 55 IDP camps and the surrounding local communities.

ADRA mainstreams DRR in ongoing development and recovery programs strengthening community preparedness and resilience.

MA PAUK LAU

“I want to go back to my home. I don’t know when I will go back home. I don’t want to run again, I am afraid.”

My name is Ma Pauk Lau. I am 18 years old and currently living as an IDP in ShweZet IDP camp. In 2011, the conflict started in my home village. I was living with my parents, 2 brothers and a sister. When we heard shooting, we ran into the forest. We stayed there almost one week.

For the past 8 years, I have been living in this camp. 6 months ago, I was in a motorbike accident in Myitkyina City. My legs were broken and would not heal until now. I cannot walk well and need assistance.

Our livelihood is very difficult. My youngest sister is 16 years old and works with my mother downtown. My father can’t work because he is also ill. I can’t attend school, but I want to attend.

We heard of the SCAIDP V project that supported those with disabilities and chronic patients. I was selected and received 10,000 MMK each month. My family also got 55,000 MMK from the household cash distribution.

I used the money for my medical fees. The money is enough for me. This project by providing money to support us is effective for our lives. Sometimes I am involved in camp activities such as cleaning the camp. The camp volunteers teach me a lot of things so I gained good experience. I really want to thank the donor and ADRA.

“We hired volunteers in the camps to assist. We can support 500 people from 99 households in these camps,” said Hkawn Din, WASH Officer from ADRA Myanmar.

“I assist in the Cash distributions and WASH activities in this camp. The project’s support process is very effective for the people. We teach them how to wash their hands and they gain a lot of knowledge,” commented Daw Zee Myoi, WASH and Cash Volunteer from ShweZet IDP Camp.

ADRA International launched their global Advocacy Campaign **Every Child. Everywhere. In School.** at an ADRA Network meeting in Jordan early 2019. The purpose of the advocacy campaign is to promote education in targeting the 262 million children out-of-school around the world. To achieve this, the goal is to collect 1 million signatures to present to world leaders at the annual GC Session in the United States.

ADRA Myanmar participated in the campaign collecting more than 12,600 signatures! Signatures were collected through partnership with the Myanmar Union Mission in; Yangon, Kachin, Kayin, Shan, Mandalay, Mon, Magway and Kayah States and Regions.

In addition to the global campaign, ADRA Myanmar was selected as one of ten focus countries to participate in an Advocacy Pilot Project. The USD\$90,000 3 year project advocates for policy change to provide incentives in order to mobilise Non-Government teachers in remote ethnic areas through partnership with RISE and the Myanmar Union Mission.

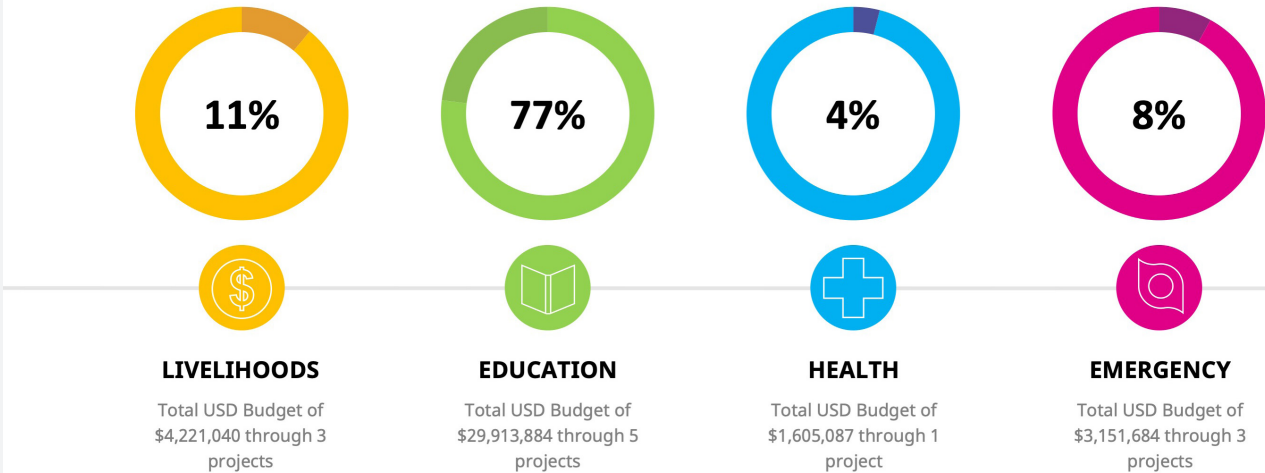

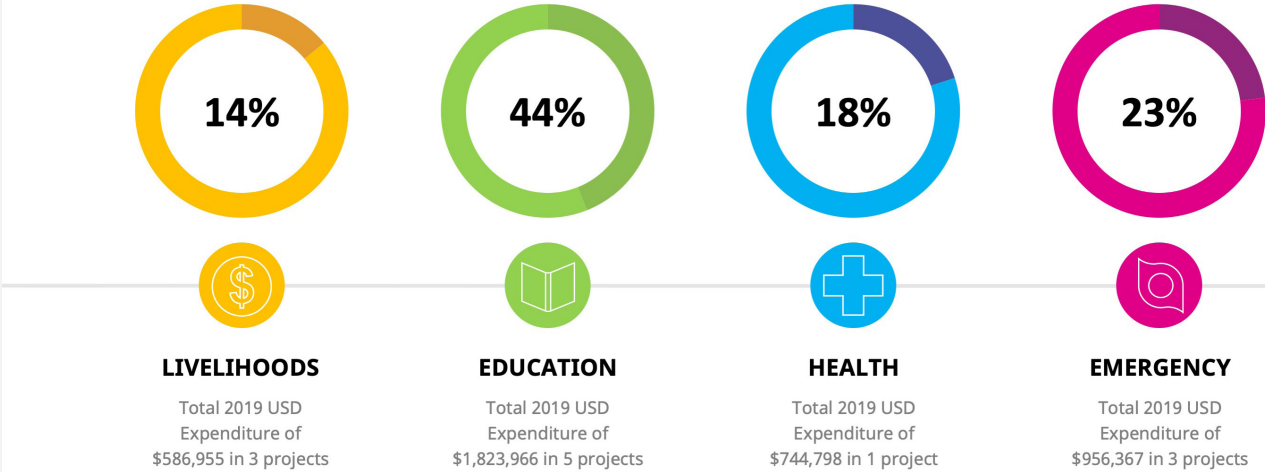

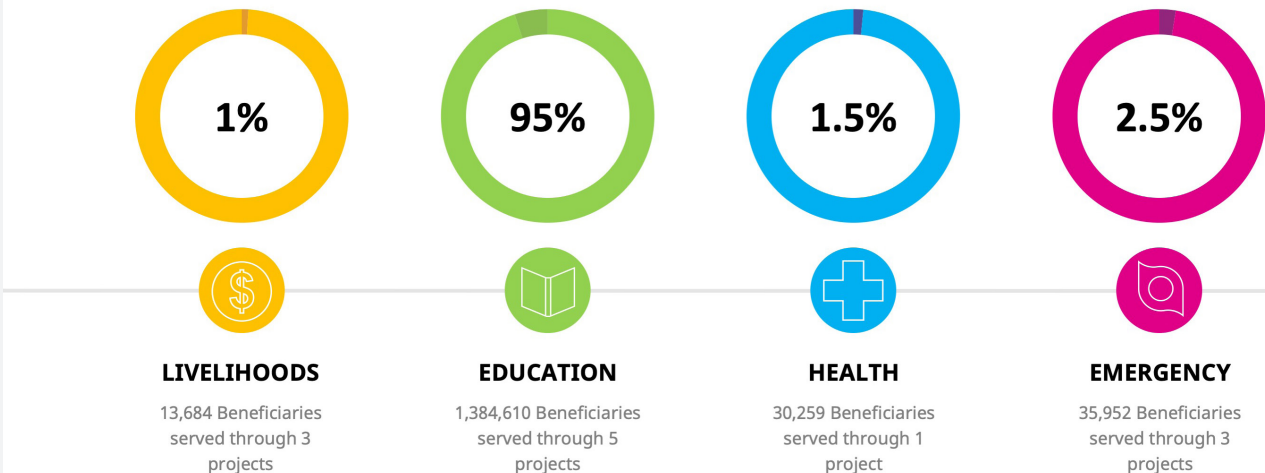
BUDGET PER SECTOR
