

The year 2015 has seen major milestones reached, with peaceful national elections in November, and the signing of the nationwide ceasefire agreement by eight ethnic groups in October. Myanmar is emerging from decades of isolation and is now engaging more substantially with humanitarian and development partners to improve conditions for its people.



ADRA Myanmar seeks to develop partnerships with rural communities, country authorities, donors and partner offices within the ADRA network. We believe that honest and authentic relationships lead to harmonious partnerships which are based on natural respect and fairness. Within this environment, partnership mobilises demand-driven funds to help those in need to realise their potential and become active partners of progress.

**EVELOPMENT** 

Long term development is a process of social and economic change whereby people are empowered to lead sustainable lives cultivated through their own independance. ADRA Myanmar believes that it is essential to engage with the community throughout the process of planning and implementation for intended community change that leads to this kind of sustainable development.

Relief refers to assistance given for emergency needs resulting from either natural disasters or conflict. Disaster relief often transitions from 'handouts' to 'development' in order to avoid 'dependancy' and enable long term sustainability. ADRA Myanmar also works to mitigate the effects of potential crisis' by developing regional strategies for effective disaster response through disaster risk reduction (DRR) training.


## **OUR REACH**

# FLOOD CRISIS 15'





**Making** landfall in July 2015, Cyclone Komen coupled with heavy monsoonal rain ravaged its way across Myanmar causing severe landslides and flooding affecting 12 of 14 States/Regions and resulting in one of the worst natural disasters seen within Myanmar's borders. Soon after, the Rakhine, Chin, Magway and Sagaing Sates/Regions were declared natural disaster zones by the local Government. As events intensified and figures rolled in, it was reported that the death toll stood at 103, critically affecting more than 1.1 million people and displacing 240,000 households nationwide.

ADRA Myanmar, being the first organisation to respond in the area, formulated an initial rapid response by supplying emergency food supplies to villages via ziplines over raging rivers and tractors through mud drenched roads around Kalay within the Sagaing Region - one of the 8 worst affected townships. In addition, ADRA Myanmar also responded in townships within the Rakhine, Chin, Kayin and Magway States/Regions providing emergency supplies and support.

As floodwaters subsided, initial assessments depicted mud 1-2 meters deep around Kalay where floodwaters had reached 5-9 meters at their peak. Local villagers were forced to literally dig their homes out of the ground losing their belongings in the floodwaters. Millions of acres of paddy fields once inundated by floodwaters, were strewn with mud and debris causing replanting in time for harvest in November an almost impossibility. With little media coverage and an underestimate on actual figures, locals faced starvation, risk of disease and lack of shelter.

In an effort to restore sustainability after the initial emergency response, ADRA Myanmar worked with locals to mobilise staff and volunteers to manage 6 projects (see Page 16) directly focused on assisting those affected by the Flood Crisis in both the Sagaing Region and the Rakhine State. Though locals are appreciative of the support provided by ADRA Myanmar and other NGOs responding in the area, long term development is needed to rebuild the livelihoods lost - something that will take years to restore. Our continual support and prayers are needed....this battle is far from over!

Poe Mya, like so many other villagers in the region, rely on farming to feed and support their families. ADRA Myanmar was able to aid Poe Mya by providing seed assistance so he could regrow his crops in time for harvest thanks to the 'Myanmar Floods Network Response' project funded and supported by the ADRA Network.






Daw Htway Mee recieved training in agriculture, savings and loans and bank management. Daw Htway Mee then borrowed 287,000 MMK in order to plant a paddy field, a small pond to feed it as well as acquiring rice, peanut, corn and sesame seeds which grow well within

For the first time in 10 years, Daw Htway Mee's crop produced more than 100 bushels increasing her overall income leaving money left over to save for future ventures.

"It is a great joy to know that this is our own field and that the rice that comes from this paddy field is ours".



#### Economic Justice targets families and households who are struggling to make ends meet and provide the basic neccessities such as food, water and an education for their children. Nationally, rural villagers engage in farming and agricultural practices, however the work is rough with little pay afforded. Furthermore, the lack of available education opportunities and the funds to pay for it, leaves many with little or no skills to offer potential employers for future work.

ADRA Myanmar seeks to provide these villagers with an alternate or addition to their current workload by providing training in income generation activities suitable for the region in which they are being implemented that are designed to supply a steady flow of income as well as offer training in how to manage and save funds appropriately. In addition, locals will have the opportunity to expand and pass on any knowledge they obtain through training for sustainable development.

Activities provided through the following projects such as food processing and marketing, managing animals, textile production and sewing, adhering to the OVEC curriculum of study developed initially for ADRA Thailand, linking to private sector financial services, providing support to savings and loans groups, and establishing revolving funds, are just some of the ways ADRA Myanmar seeks to improve the economic status of communities in the Chin and Kayin States.

## Education is an important componant of any kind of sustainable

development. ADRA Myanmar works with schools and teachers by offering support, financial assistance in rennovating or building school buildings, providing scholarships to vulnerable families, tailoring school materials to facilitate children displaced by conflict, and improve the capacity of local government education institutions.

In addition, ADRA Myanmar engages with Christian groups in an effort to link them to the CESR 'Comprehensive Education Sector Review' which is designed to bring about education reform throughout the country and improve illiteracy rates amongst rural communities.

Responsible health care and the provision to alleviate ignorance in regards to sanitation and hygiene to reduce the risk of contracting diseases and infection is an important aspect of ADRA Myanmar's work.

Various regions in Myanmar suffer from regular clashes and conflict forcing families to leave and relocate to 'safer' states. Several of ADRA Myanmar's projects are tailored to target IDPs in an effort to support those without a permanant home and improve living standards in IDP camps.

Project activities include; funding and supporting mobile health clinics that service numerous villages, providing medical supplies, training locals to become CHWs 'Community Health Workers' to run and operate the mobile health clinics, facilitating the development of wells and water tanks for alternate clean water sources, building latrines and teaching good hygiene practices such as washing hands in schools and IDP camps, and providing training in safe cooking practices.

In addition, ADRA Myanmar provide awareness training on the dangers of land mines through mine risk education in the Kachin State up in Myanmar's north, as well as providing support to those with disabilities.





Gender Inclusion has been a point of contention worldwide for hundreds of years. 




