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Vocational Training Centre Construction Brings Education Opportunities to Kayin State

Interview with VT (Vocational Training) School Committee Leader, Saw Pu Khar.

When I first heard that KECD was launching a new Vocational Training Centre in partnership with ADRA Myanmar, I was happy, very happy. I feel that it is really useful and beneficial for future generations. Vocational Education is not formal education, it requires a high standard of education in order to earn a living. I have always said that it is really useful to learn.

I could not help much financially to construct the training school, but I did what I could. I contacted the other village leaders to support site cleaning prior to construction and organizing the community to actively participate. We also chipped stones to create a pathway to the school and built a new dormitory for the students.

Three villages supported the construction by KECD including Mae Ka Nel, Noe Hpoe and Htee Mu Hta villages. I was very happy to know that ADRA Myanmar would support it. The training center belongs to all of us. I want vocational education to be sustainable in our area. The Karen people have suffered many years and have repeatedly hoped for peace. I want to tell the leaders from KECD and the community to continue to work hard for sustainability and I will help as much as possible.

I would like to see the expansion of more short courses in order to create more job opportunities for young people in rural areas so that they will be able to generate their own income and support their families. I do not want it to disappear in a year or two. I want it to last forever and be available to generation after generation even when I have passed on.

Thank you so much for providing the teachers' and students' stipend as well as teaching materials. This assistance is really important. Thank you to ADRA Myanmar who came to assist this vocational training center.

PROJECT UPDATES







AEON

The AEON 1% Club Foundation and ADRA Japan funded AEON project completed 6 activities as follows:

1) School construction was completed in five villages including Mu War, Par Yar, Pa Yar Kone Kaw Ka Dar, Htee Ta Blu Hta and Kaw Hpar Doe

2) School furniture was provided to these five villages for use in the constructed schools

3) School gear was distributed for students

4) 8 SMC meetings were conducted from 11-17 May

5) An endline survey was completed

6) Interviews to SMC and parents were also completed



PRICE

Despite many challenges, the DFAT and ADRA Australia funded PRICE project was able to conduct sewing training in two locations including Gangaw and Lungngo. The training teaches basic sewing skills of both men and women's clothing, The purpose of the training is to provide trainees the skills they need to make and sell items for income.

16 trainees participated in the training from 15 of the 16 project villages. Of the 16 trainees, ten are new whereas as six have previously attended sewing training sessions.

A trainee from Lungkaa village said, "Our trainer is very patient with us, keeps us always busy with the training lessons and the way the trainer presents the lessons is simple, clear and easy for us to understand."

The trainer stated, "I am happy with the progress they have made over the course of this one-month long training."

SEAQE2

The Norad and ADRA Norway funded SEAQE2 project held a closing ceremony for Batch 1/2021 short course training graduates from KECD including 67 students (29 male and 39 female). The three short course trainings included; Basic Sewing, Rural Mechanics and Hair Dressing.

The closing ceremony was held on 21 May at the KECD VT center in Noe Hpoe Village. There were several in attendance including, school committee members, KECD staff, parents, ADRA staff and around 200 members.

The SEAQE2 projects upcoming activities plan is to coordinate with KECD for short course activities for the remainder of 2021 with pending plans to reopen for Batch 2/2021 in the last week of June. Informal short course training has reopened for 40 students in 4 courses including Advanced Sewing, Hair Dressing, Hair Cutting and Welding set to end in July 2021.
