U Thang's Story: Agricultural Exposure Trip Benefits Chin-Based Coffee Farmer

45 year old coffee farmer U Thang is father to six living in a village with a population of 409 in Chin State.

Before farming coffee, U Thang cultivated Elephant Foot Yam. Though successful to some extent, U Thang felt it wise to invest in the cultivation of perennial crops. Coffee plantations can be harvested yearly once the fruit has reached maturity, but his initial knowledge was limited on how to breed coffee in the seedbeds which led to an unsuccessful yield.

U Thang accompanied an exposure trip to Pyin Oo Lwin pre-COVID that was facilitated by the project. This is where he had the privilege of raising his interests, concerns, and setbacks with well-experienced farmers getting answers to some of his big concerns.

Back home with renewed motivation and lessons learned, he began preparing the soil and started a nursery on his three-acre farm, where twelve thousand seedlings are now seen thriving. Applying what he learned, the undeniable result in his words were "the survival rate after the trip increased 85% from 31%."

U Thang is expecting to transplant at least 5,000 seedlings, if not 10,000 to secure sufficient farmland and sell to interested farmers for 500-750 MMKs each seed. U Thang also wants to see a fundamental change in the approach local people take towards agricultural farming and cultivation to penetrate markets.

Ideally with a farm of 10,000 coffee plants, U Thang is aiming to secure a foothold in penetrating the market with a quality he is completely responsible for and approves. To meet this end, he said he still needs continuing support from the project in terms of both value-adding and market linkage.

“ I have had failed attempts in the previous nursery. But, as I ask for answers to my problems from farmers and managers I had the privilege of meeting during the trip, I now can successfully do coffee breeding nursery on my own.”

PROJECT UPDATES



BRIGHT

The Global Affairs Canada and ADRA Canada funded BRIGHT project in partnership with KNWO and Women's LEAD, provided training this month to TEES.

The two days training to promote and be able to implement Gender Equality Concept and Environmental Knowledge for TEES teachers was conducted from June 8-9 in Mine Yaw, Lashio Township, Northern Shan State.

30 people including 12 males and 18 females from 17 target villages attended the training as well as 2 staff from the BRIGHT project including the Gender Officer and Education Officer to teach the gender and environmental concept.



CASE2Learn

The European Union funded CASE2Learn project in partnership with RISE completed the following activities:

In Shan State, 15 TPC students started teaching in schools most in need. Teacher stipends were distributed to remaining teachers on 26 June for Year 2 of the project. Focal points (FPC), Mobile Teacher Trainers (MTTs) and SMAs discussed plans to travel to the field to meet with 74 communities to discuss schooling of children. MTTs and SMAs also visited 16 TEES schools for data monitoring.

SVT training was conducted since 1 June and the participants sent to TEES schools in July. 50 schools were planned to open in Year 3 of the project teaching subjects Myanmar, English, Maths, Ta'ang Language and General Studies.

In Chin State, FPC, MTTs and SMAs are arranging home based learning.



PROJECT UPDATES



AEON

The AEON 1% Club and ADRA Japan funded AEON5 project held SMC (School Management Committee) meetings in 5 target villages including Par Yar, Pa Yar Kone Kaw Ka Dar, Htee Ta Blu Hta, Kaw Hpar Doe and Mu War. The SMC meetings were held between 15-21 June 2021.

The AEON5 project also conducted school assessments in preparation for AEON6, the next phase of the project set to start in late 2021.



SEAQE2

The Norad and ADRA Norway funded SEAQE2 project conducted a PTA Awareness meeting from 23-28 May with 661 participants from 7 ACS and 16 GoM schools to discuss positive parenting, positive discipline, and corporal punishment.

A closing ceremony was held for batch 1/2021 from the NFE program on 2 June with 27 graduates including 7 male and 20 female.

An NFE coordination meeting was held to discuss development of the program and curriculum.

Lastly, informal short course training is now being offered including Hair Dressing, Hair Cutting, Advance Sewing and Welding. Each course now accepts 10 students. Total training hours are 396 (200hrs theory/practical, 76hrs life skills, 120hrs internship). 42 students have enrolled from Kayin State.



PROJECT UPDATES



SURE

The MFAT and ADRA New Zealand funded SURE project distributed seeds for cultivating chili in Chin State to a female farmer. 600 seedlings were planted in October 2020 and transplanted on 20 January 2021.

At the beginning of the cultivation period under the guidance of the Agriculture Officer, weekly field visits were conducted by the Salt Assistant and Extension Workers. Advice was given in relation to Irrigation, weeding, pest control, supplementation, and preparation of natural remedies for use in the field.

Harvesting time began in April 2021 yielding 90 Viss. 1 Viss was sold for 2,500 kyats. Green chili is harvested and sold once a week.

The female farmer was happy that the chilli plantation is now successful, and she was able to generate income, as well as sharing it with her neighbors.



VESI

The LIFT funded VESI project in partnership with AVSI and FRC opened the motorbike short course for batch 4 of the digital blended motorbike training on 1 June 2021 ending 15 July 2021, 10 weeks in total.

The training is 6 days per week held in Shan State including 6 weeks practical and 4 weeks internship. An agreement has been made with 12 motorbike workshops for students to complete their internships. Training charges cost 360,000 MMK per practitioner and per workshop for the practical program.

37 males from 6 villages enrolled in the course. Upon completion, trainees will have the skills and knowledge they need to repair and service motorbikes.

The project also provided COVID-19 protective items such as hand sanitizer, mask, soap and stationary and meal charges to students.
