COVID-19 RESPONSE

ADRA Myanmar has been responding to the COVID-19 pandemic through the Vocational Education Support for IDPs - VESI project funded by LIFT Myanmar. Activities have primarily revolved around distributions of hygiene materials, and awareness raising for COVID -19.

Here are some of the ways ADRA Myanmar provided support and relief to vulnerable communities in 2021.

- 1062 masks boxes distributed
- 708 handgels to vulnerable households
- 1770 soaps distributed
- 1770 faceshields distributed
- 354 chlorines
- 12 thermometer to IDPcamps

ADRA Myanmar will continue to work closely with the vulnerable communities to respond to COVID-19 pandemic.









EDUCATION SECTOR

The **EDUCATION** sector aims to provide assistance to teachers, students, communities and schools to enhance local education systems and improve quality of learning through the provision of learning materials, developing school infrastructure, promoting professional development of teachers, support to school management committees and parent teacher associations, and support for advocacy and policy development.

The programs promote inclusion and social cohesion to address needs of learners, lessen gender imbalances, increase protection of women, girls and boys and positively shape values, attitudes and skills. ADRA has developed positive relationships with Indigenous Providers of Education in conflict affected areas where children do not have access to an education, reaching thousands of Out of School children through teachers establishing Education service (TEES) programs and distributing teaching and learning materials. For those who have 'missed' the opportunity for education, technical and vocational education and training (TVET) programs provide youth with employable skills through market-driven competency-based short courses that are certified.

ADRA's advocacy and policy engagement is evidence based and developed around synergies that build cooperation and mutual trust between key stakeholders supporting the humanitarian-development-peace nexus. In addition, ADRA is also a part of the Education Development Partners Coordination Group (EDPCG) and technical working groups.

U TUN

My name is U Tun, and I am the headmaster of a primary school in Kayin State. When I graduated from college, I couldn't find a job, so I moved to Yangon where I worked at an ice-cream shop for 8 months.

Soon after I applied for a teaching position working at a primary school for 3 years before moving to my current school in 2018.

When I arrived at the school, there was not enough teachers or furniture, and the villagers didn't hold school management (SMC) meetings. I tried to foster good relationships with the villagers, but the students had difficulties learning the Burmese language. Because the school was old and rundown, I requested support for funds to renovate the school.

I was happy when the AEON project came to this village as I heard ADRA had built many schools in areas nearby. The school was in desperate need of new furniture and more classrooms. In the summer months, the classrooms were so hot for both teachers and students alike.

It took 4 months for school

construction to be finalized with the support of the villagers including exterior work such as fencing, school signboard, water tank, toilet and school gate. I helped the workers obtain local materials such as sand, brick and stone. Whenever there were issues with the construction process, I always called the AEON project engineer for support.

Soon, I was able to establish SMC meetings once a month and encourage parents to attend education awareness events causing them to be more active in their children's education. The children are happy and want to attend school. My aim is to expand the school into a Middle level and continue to work with villagers to maintain our new school building.

"Since the school construction was finished, it has been very helpful for me in teaching and increased safety for the children. Now we have sufficient rooms and enough furniture."

LIVELIHOODS SECTOR

The **LIVELIHOODS** sector aims to increase food security, livelihoods and resilience in the upland areas of Myanmar. This is achieved by diversifying livelihoods, introducing climate-smart agricultural approaches such as: drip irrigation, as well as piloting holistic grazing management practices to address land degradation.

Programs are focused on building technical knowledge and learning to enable future evidence-based planning and policy dialogue to address: climate change and extreme weather related events, building resilience through enabling the development of absorptive, adaptive and transformative capacities, and knowledge and strategies for sustainable livelihoods.

Beneficiaries are provided training in planting of seasonal crops, raising and caring for livestock, developing cultural skills such as weaving and increasing knowledge of value chain marketing to increase income generation.

Programs in upland areas focus on improving natural resource management and land use planning using Sloping Agricultural Land Technologies (SALT) and diversifying livelihoods to reduce dependence on rain fed agriculture to improve water resource management. This promotes sustainable forest land management and prevention of land degradation through reducing overuse of Swidden agriculture techniques.

U MAN TIN

My name is U Man Tin and I currently live in Chin state. There are seven members in my family and three of my children are currently enrolled in elementary school. I own four acres of farm on which I grow elephant foot yam and corn.

Unfortunately, in 2015, we faced damage to our farm due to landslides and soil erosion in our area. As a result of this, we had difficulty producing enough food, struggling even to support my family. That is why I searched for a new farm. Slash and burn farming had been traditionally practiced year after year. With these devastating practices, climate change, deforestation, and landslides occurring more frequently in our area. This creates many difficulties for farming and producing food.

In 2016, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs & Trade (MFAT) and ADRA New Zealand funded SURE project, came to our area to develop the livelihoods of the people through sustainable farming. Thus, leading to income generation without damaging the environment.

During these years, the project introduced Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT) in our area. SALT farming is gradually improving the soil and air quality. The main purpose is to maintain and protect nutrient rich soil. From this, other farmers also started to develop SALT farms. Through the project, I was provided barbed wire, water pipes, annual seeds, and perennial nursery plants for my individual SALT farm. Since the project came, I learned many farming techniques from Extension Workers and Agriculture staff from the ADRA. Therefore, with my skills and experiences learned from the SURE project, gradually over time, I was able to develop my own SALT farm.

"I am really interested in farming, so after the SALT farming system was introduced to me, I decided to develop of my land as a SALT farm. Now, I can plant multiple seasonal crops in the same area, throughout the year."

In 2021, I was able to harvest 5 baskets of corn from my SALT farms in just 0.09 acres. I also used a project-provided solar dryer to dry my harvested corn seeds which was really helpful and time-saving.

"Thank you for your support. I am happy that now I am able to plant for the whole season in my SALT farm without doing slash and burn in the forest. I can also provide food for my family and I have increased my income through SALT farming."

HEALTH SECTOR

The **HEALTH** sector supports vulnerable population groups in conflict affected areas. ADRA Myanmar actively supports health in Myanmar since 1993 and has built strong working relationships with a variety of organizations and groups.

The programs improve the health and nutrition of communities by: training health workers in maternal, new born and child health (MNCH), improving nutrition rates amongst pregnant mothers and children, providing hygiene education, developing water, sanitation and medical facilities, operating mobile health clinics, providing medical supplies, supporting referrals, promoting healthy living and increasing awareness on relevant health issues.

ADRA Myanmar focuses on water, and sanitation services, maternal and child health, and provides handwashing and bathing facilities for displaced people in remote areas where there is no access to health facilities.

EMERGENCY SECTOR

The **EMERGENCY** sector provides humanitarian assistance to those affected by natural disasters or conflict through multi-purpose cash grants, cash for work, food assistance, non-food items, shelter assistance, and increasing access to clean water and sanitation facilities.

ADRA Myanmar has a National Emergency Management Plan (NEMP) in place that enables the rapid mobilization of team members and resources in the event of a disaster. Several of ADRA Myanmar's staff have been trained in Emergency Response in order to provide and lead the technical support required during an emergency in country.

Through partnerships such as AVSI and the Finnish Refugee Council, ADRA Myanmar works in conflict affected areas in Northern Shan States to support the education of children and youth, health and livelihoods for IDPs and the surrounding local communities.

MG AUNG

Rise from a simple family background, Mg Aung grew up with his parents and siblings. He is the 17 years old and eldest son of their siblings and has five family members. He lives in Northern Shan State.

He is eager to learn and wants to take a course that is useful for life. And also in their area, most of the young people have already migrated and the other young people are used to work in electrical wiring and motorbike repair industries. And he has seen the youth unemployment rate is rising in their environment.

Due to many situations, there has a challenge of lack of job opportunities, migration, skills labor rarity in northern Shan State. Soon, he heard about the ADRA project's vocational training so that he was interested in motorbike repair training and decided to join the program.

The LIFT Myanmar-funded VESI project, in partnership with AVSI and the Finnish Refugee Council, aims to provide vocational training to youth in IDP camps in northern Shan State to increase their income and meet the needs of the labor market. And also, ADRA provided meal allowance, teaching materials, and Covid-19 protective gear (Mask, Handgel, Faceshield) throughout the training.

He attended a motorbike repairing short course for long 36 days. In this training, he learned many helpful subjects related to motorcycle repair. He gains a lot of knowledge for his life career.

Since he was involved in the ADRA project his life started to change as he improved in social skills, life skills, and vocational skills. The willingness to implement his own business indwell in his vein and he owned his parent's trust and support. His dream is to become a business owner in the future.
