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Ngun Thang's Story: Building A New Agricultural Future

30 years old, Ngun Thang, who lives in Matupi Township, Southern Chin State, is a Sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT) farmer, cultivating his two acres of SALT farmland. He heads a three-member family, including his wife, mother, and himself, and takes care of his elderly mother.

He was formerly a typical small-scale Chin farmer, running the family's livelihood based on slash and burn agricultural practice, which is considered to be unsustainable for agricultural land management and degradable for the environment.

With the introduction of SALT by the MFAT and ADRA New Zealand funded SURE (Sustainable Rural Economic Development Project) in late 2019, he took a special interest in the agricultural practices entailed by SALT because he learned from the project that he could have more complete management of the soil in his plot and he could sustain it by always regenerating the soil of the farmland for longer-term use.

In the farmland plot, perennial crops like avocado, chili, and lime, planted last fall, are seen thriving, with a survival rate of 76% with avocado and 75% with lime.

He intends to plant 280 coffee seedlings and 25 more avocado seedlings from his home-grown nursery in the rainy season.

Besides, there are some more seeds of crops like 40 bags of avocado, one tin of coffee, and three vises of elephant foot yam already grown and under nurtured in the nursery.

He received the support of 21 coils of barbed wire and 4 coils of soft water pipes from the project.

The total harvest he achieved in the last harvest season from the farmland was: 12 baskets of sweet corn and a sale of 250,000 MMK worth of elephant foot yam. His transition from Slash and Burn to SALT permanent gardening is not yet full-fledged. He hopes his transition to SALT is completed in a couple of years, materializing his ultimate dream of economic gain and of fulfilling the needs of the family.

"I hope the perennial crops in the plot will bring us a passive income in the near future."

This month, the LIFT-funded VESI project, in partnership with AVSI and FRC, completed the following activities:

- 1. Closing ceremony was held for Batch 8 training with 160 students and 21 local trainers in Kutkai Township.
- 2. Business Coordination Meeting was conducted for Batch 9 with 18 local trainers in Lashio.
- 3. Providing Life Skills and Business Skills training to 120 students from Batch 9.
- 4. Conducting of the opening ceremony for batch 9 training under five courses (basic motorbike, basic sewing, advanced motorbike, basic computer, and handicraft training).

BRIGHT

This month, the Global Affairs Canada and ADRA Canada funded BRIGHT project implemented the following activities.

- 1. Conducting opening ceremony of basic sewing training was held on June 12 at the Lashio training center. A total of 29 participants attended. 16 females are enrolled in the training.
- 2. The project conducted a midterm review workshop from June 8 to June 20. Focus Group discussions with Col MEL beneficiaries and male and female beneficiaries in project target villages were conducted from June 8 to 10.
- 3. An Orientation Meeting was conducted with TEI (Ta'ang Education Institution) partners on June 28 and 29, 2022.
- 4. The closing ceremony for TEES students in the 2021–2022 academic year was held on June 13, 2022, in Kayah State. The project distributed student kits to 1500 TEES students from Kayah State.











MOFA

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan and ADRA Japan-funded MOFA project completed the following activities:

School construction is 75% completed, including with toilets, wells, and teachers' houses. The school management committee meeting was conducted in the project's targeted village.

To promote health awareness-raising, the health promoter shares health and hygiene knowledge with the students.

The project provides a school building, furniture, school gear, and hygiene awareness training in Hlaing Bwe Township.

CASE2Learn

The European Union-funded CASE2Learn project, in partnership with RISE, ADRA UK, and ADRA Germany, completed the following activities:

Summer vacation training was conducted by partner KTWG in Hpapun Township, Kayin State.

KTWG has completed all the 18 SVT training courses according to the project implementation plan. During this training, all participants engaged actively in group discussions.













ELACAP

The USAID-funded 'Emergency Life-Saving Assistance in Conflict-Affected Population (ELACAP)' project, in partnership with the Committee of Internally Displaced Karen People (CIDKP), constructed a community latrine with wash facilities in Hlaing Bwe Township, Kayin State.

From this support, 163 households (316 males and 381 females) have since directly benefitted from these new constructions to limit disease transmission through ensuring improved, rehabilitated excreta disposal facilities and handwashing facilities for IDPs to maintain hygiene in partnership with CIDKP.

SHAPE

The MFAT and ADRA New Zealand funded 'Sustainable Health Agriculture Protection and Empowerment (SHAPE)' project completed the following activities:

229 farmers from the project's targeted villages attended Farmer Field School Training on the study of plant growth; water management; pest management; organic fertilizer application of corn, ginger, EFY, coffee, avocado, and lime plants; and good agricultural practices.

The project also provides water pipelines and tarpaulin to 10 farmers for the SALT demonstration plots.

















The UNICEF-funded UNICEF Emergency WASH project completed the following activities:

In Kayin State, WASH supplies, COVID-19 prevention, and sanitationrelated IEC materials were distributed to 5392 households.

Health education sessions on hygiene awareness, mitigating COVID19 spread, and health services were conducted in Kyarinnseikgyi Township, Kawkareik Township, and Hlaingbwe Township.

For 248 households, 248 single-unit community latrines were built. A total of 100 bath houses were built to benefit (169) households and (1228) community members from this activity. 8 gravity flow water systems were constructed/renovated in 8 villages, and 6123 community members from 963 households benefited from this activity.



This month, the AEON 1% Club and ADRA Japan-funded AEON5 Additional Project supported school renovation activities at one of the ACS/Community Schools in Kawkareik Township, Kayin State.

- School floor renovation (24' x 63')
- School entrance gate door work (12'x7')
- Students' desks and benches (30 sets)

By conducting the school renovation activities in the targeted school, the quality of the school plant will be improved and students will be able to concentrate on learning healthily and safely.
